## Mark: The Gospel of Action

I.	Mark (also known as John Mark) lived in Jerusalem with his mother, a wealthy and influential leader in the Jerusalem church (Acts 12:12).
2.	The early church fathers all agree that Mark was the interpreter for This suggests that the Gospel of Mark is his report of the words and deeds of Jesus.
said Iow	ias ark, who became Peter's interpreter, wrote accurately, though not in order, all that he remembered of the things of the tord one by the Lord. For he had neither heard the Lord nor been one of His followers, but afterwards, he had foled Peter, who used to compose his discourses with a view to the needs of his hearers, but not as though he were wing up a connected account of the Lord's sayings."
3.	Mark wrote sometime between AD. There is considerable textual evidence that his was the first Gospel written. It appears to form the framework for both Matthew's and Luke's Gospel.
4.	Mark wrote his Gospel especially for the Romans (it was probably written from Rome). This is exhibited in:
